Nestboxes abound

Wedderburn College

It has been a busy couple of months for the Networks Nestboxes for Kids program. The Wedderburn Men's Shed finished construction of approximately 40 nestboxes for various animals, so next up was time a coat of paint.

The Grades 3 – 6 students from the Wedderburn College painted the boxes following a presentation by Anthony Gallacher on the importance of nestboxes in conservation.

The Duke of Edinburgh Students from Year 9 have GPS-ed 20 suitable trees behind the school for nestbox mounting and a further 20 trees at the Hard Hills Reserve in Wedderburn.

East Loddon College

The Grades 6 Woodwork class at East Loddon College have also been working on their nestboxes. Amongst learning how not “choke the chicken” when using a hammer and making sure the box sides are flush, the students have enjoyed the practical side to their project.

Volunteers undertake autumn bird survey

The first volunteer survey as part of the Loddon Plains Community Bird Monitoring Project was undertaken in late May. 12 bird monitoring participants undertook surveys across 45 sites in the Network's area, ranging from the Sunday Morning Hills to the Terrick Terrick National Park.

All surveys are undertaken using the 2 ha 20 min survey technique used for the Bird Atlas of Australia. The data from the summer (benchmark) and autumn surveys are available on the LPLN website under the Community Bird Monitoring Project page.

Some of the more unusual sightings amongst the survey sites included a Diamond Firetail, Grey-crowned Babblers, Singing Honeyeaters and a Peregrine Falcon.

More volunteers will join the winter survey in August, with surveys continuing seasonally in order to build a picture of the bird biodiversity across the Network area.

If you are interested in joining the surveys or finding out more about the project, the sites, or the birds, please get in touch. For those wanting to learn birding skills there will be options to join the surveys and learn from experienced enthusiasts.
