We were very pleased to be among the successful applicants for a 20 Million Trees grant which will help us get over 10,000 trees and shrubs into the ground in 2015/2016 through the Calivil Creek revegetation, as part of the GOANNA Project.

Silverleaf Nightshade Workshops

Landholders who are interested in learning quality management techniques for tackling the weed Silverleaf Nightshade (also known as Whitehorse Nettle), are encouraged to register for one of two *free* field days being run in the Loddon Shire on the 25th & 26th February 2015.

The days will feature up to date research and advice on management of this common summer growing weed, as well as information on how to participate in on farm trials for control of the weed.

NSW DPI researcher Dr Hanwen Wu and Murrumbidgee Landcare project officer Phil Bowden will present detailed information on Silverleaf Nightshade and answer questions from participants about the best control options for the local area. Field days include:

These events are funded by the Meat and Livestock Association through the New South Wales Department of Primary Industries, Murrumbidgee Landcare and the Graham Centre for Agricultural Innovation and hosted by the Loddon Plains Landcare Network.

Network secures project grant for Calivil Creek revegetation

The Loddon Plains Landcare Network is one of 57 projects that has secured a 20 Million Trees Grant from the Australian Government's 20 Million Trees Programme.

The grant of \$53,064 will go towards revegetating 65 ha of degraded Black Box Woodlands along the Calivil Creek, Yarrawalla. The project includes the planting of 3560 seedlings, 16km direct seeding and community planting days with local schools. The Network secured project funding for the fencing of the area through DEPI in Kerang.

The project is a significant step for the Network and will roll out over 2015-2016.

Other Network projects for 2015

Wheel Cactus Control Program

This project involves a community based program to control outbreaks of Wheel Cactus on private land on Mt Buckrabanyule. Wheel Cactus (*Opuntia robusta*) is a Weed of National Significance. Outbreaks of the weed in the region require a community approach to tackling the weed, which inhabits over 1000ha in the Buloke Shire.

The Loddon Plains Landcare Network will work with the community to run cactus control days on local properties once every couple of months. The main methods for controlling the weed are stem injection with glyphosate and removal of seedlings with hoes.

Each community day will consist of a volunteer safety induction, then 3 hours of work controlling cactus. Days will conclude with lunch and cuppa to thank volunteers for their time and effort.

Bird Monitoring

The community bird monitoring project will form a baseline for ongoing data collection to observe trends and changes in bird numbers and biodiversity. Monitoring is undertaken at 45 sites across the Network's area ranging from high quality remnants to isolated corridors.

Data is collected by local community volunteers every season through the 2 hectare, 20 minute bird survey methodology, which will continue throughout 2015. The Network has 1 year worth of data collected from 2014 surveys. There are ongoing opportunities for volunteers to join the monitoring.

Hybrid Fairy Wren stumps observers

LPLN bird monitoring volunteers required some back up expertise from bird experts, in order to nail the identity of a mysterious Fairy-Wren residing with a flock of Superb Fairy-Wrens at Thunder Swamp, Dingee.

Initially thought to be a Splendid Fairy-Wren well out of its range, closer inspection in November and the later sighting of another species on the other side of the swamp revealed a unique story.

The little bird (pictured below) is now believed to be a hybrid Superb Fairy-Wren and White-winged Fairy-Wren owing to the distinctly broken black markings on the head/nape, a deeper blue plumage and pale wings.
